

The red grouse is a medium-sized game bird. It has a plump body, a short tail and a lightly hook-tipped bill. It is reddish-brown, with its legs and feet covered in pale feathers.



The Glenelly Valley
The longest valley in the Sperrins, a majestic mountain range formed approximately 500 million years ago. The Glenelly River is full of salmon and trout and is home to the otter and the kingfisher.

The Sperrin Heritage Centre

An ideal resting point providing an opportunity to sample a real taste of the Sperrins.

At a height of 678m Sawel is the highest of the Sperrins' peaks.

Enjoy a stroll or cycle around this forest where Learmount Castle was built in 1830. The original structure, part of which still remains would have been a fortified plantation house or bawn.

Butterlope Glen

Like Barnes and Gortin Glen this is a glacial spillway cut by the meltwaters of a large post-glacial lake. This action exposed the greenish coloured schists, quartzites and limestone, some of the oldest rocks in the Sperrins.

Clogherny Wedge Tomb

Situated in an area of blanket bog access is on foot from Butterlope Glen. This particular site dates from approximately 2000B.C.

A picturesque crossroads village in the heart of the Sperrins, standing on the banks of the Glenelly River.
